Prayer. If God wants this to happen, He will make it happen. Get a group of people together to do something like a 54-day for insight on what God wants. The prayer however needs to be God's will be done and be detached from a decision one way or another for guidance of the Holy Spirit.

### Notecard responses:

Create options/pathways for moving forward with pros/cons.

Prepare a plan to communicate what was shared tonight. Many of these facts were not known. There were "myth busters".

Look into what other parishes have done across the diocese and the nation.

Budget for repairs to the church. Money donated toward area of the church. What \*\* to the cemetery. The history of the city and the church go together. Fund to make the repair possible. Ask old parishioners who were born here: If we restored the church, make it possible with a walk with bricks with names of them. Each brick has a donor. Arboretum does this at \$250 a brick.

Summary notes (What the notetaker heard if not clearly identified from their notes above):

Save the church. If we are worried about money, many will donate money and time to do the work. Please have a clear vision and design a plan to get there. We have limited resources so we need to make a reasonable decision to get to where we decide to go.

The church is a part of our town before it was a town. We have a fiduciary responsibility to our ancestors to preserve it. Were there ever funds set aside at the church for it? If we move forward with a plan, there may be more enthusiasm.

It is part of the cemetery. Where does that leave the cemetery if we don't maintain the church?

Use social media with pictures from inside to get the word out to parishioners and the community. The financial burden is not on parishioners alone. Capital campaign with pledges over 3 years.

Chanhassen is becoming generic. The church is the only history left. The Catholic Church is steeped in history. Don't lose this part. A feasibility study is needed – what is the cost of the alternative? Cost of leveling it could be high? What is the property worth today? If we sell, what would go there? We don't want a brewery next to our cemetery.

Sweat equity – The KCs and other volunteers would do some of the work. If we can raise \$500,000 immediately, can we finance they rest over 30 years?

It belongs here. Europe keeps churches that are much older. Why can't we keep a 150 year old church? There is lots of talent in our parish. It's a priority to not let it get more damaged. Members of 30 years haven't been able to go inside. Need open houses. I'm surprised how good it looks. The foundation looks good.

My dad dug out the basement by hand. The historic museum next to the old church includes many historical artifacts of the church.

Communities need more now of how our faith shapes community and the importance of living a biblical life. We have a duty to share this with the community.
